At inception, it was a Junior College affiliated to the Kerala University, but later came under the jurisdiction of Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam on its formation in 1983. The College has immensely contributed to the cause of higher learning and development of this region. The College offers Six Degree courses viz; B.Sc. Physics, B.Sc. Zoology, B.Sc. Chemistry, B.A. Economics, B.A. Political Science and B.Com. Post Graduate Course in Commerce was started in 2013 to meet the ever growing demand for higher education. Apart from these regular streams, the College has started a full fledged Computer centre; St. Xavier's Institute of Information Technology (XIIT), which offers short term courses like DCA, PGDCA and Tally to regular students as well as outsiders catering to ever growing demands in this field. The Multi Gym facility provided in the College ensures the physical health of the students and equips them to compete in various sports and games. Apart from these, the College offers a foundation course in Karnatic Music, Martial arts training and an Enhancement Programme in English.

REVISED REGULATIONS FOR UNDER GRADUATE
PROGRAMMES UNDER CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM 2017
Preamble

Mahatma Gandhi University introduced Choice Based Credit and Semester and Grading System in colleges affiliated to the University from the Academic Year 2009-10, under Direct Grading System. Subsequently, the Kerala State Higher Education Council constituted a committee of experts headed by Prof. B Hridayakumari, to study and make recommendations for the improvement of the working of the Choice Based Credit and Semester System in colleges affiliated to the Universities in the State. The State Government accepted the recommendations of the Committee and the Syndicate and the Academic Council of the Mahatma Gandhi University has resolved to reform the existing CBCSS regulations. Accordingly Regulations for Under Graduate Programmes under Choice Based Course-Credit-Semester System and Grading, 2013, was introduced in the University from the Academic year 2013-14 onwards, under Indirect Grading System. The University Grants Commission, in order to facilitate student mobility across institutions within and across the states insisted to introduce uniform grading system in the Universities. On the basis of the UGC directives, various Board of Studies / Expert committees framed draft Regulations and syllabi for various UG Programmes to be made effective from 2016-17 academic year onwards. The Academic Council held on 18th July 2016 resolved to postpone the implementation of the regulations and syllabi for UG Programmes and to implement from 2017-2018 academic year after detailed discussions with the experts and other stake holders. On the basis of the suggestions put forth by the joint meeting of Faculties and also based on the discussions and suggestions in the workshops conducted for the purpose, Chairpersons of various faculties submitted modified draft Regulations, Scheme and Syllabi and text books for various undergraduate Programmes and the Standing committee of the Academic Council at its meeting held on 5th May 2017 resolved to recommend to the Academic council to approve the modified Regulations, Scheme and Syllabi and text books for various undergraduate programmes. Hence it becomes necessary to issue modified Regulations as follows.

1. TITLE

1.1. These regulations shall be called “**MAHATMA GANDHI UNIVERSITY REGULATIONS FOR UNDER GRADUATE PROGRAMMES UNDER CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM 2017**”

2. SCOPE

2.1. Applicable to all regular Under Graduate Programmes conducted by the University with effect from 2017 admissions, except for Professional and B.Voc. Programmes. Also applicable to Distance/Private Undergraduate Programmes with suitable modifications. Under Graduate Programmes in Management Studies are included as non-professional programmes.

2.2. Examinations of the courses being run under the Distance/Private registration scheme shall be conducted annually.

2.3. Medium of instruction is English except in the case of language courses other than English unless otherwise stated therein.

2.4. The provisions supersede all the existing regulations for the Regular/Distance/Private Undergraduate programmes to the extent herein prescribed.

3. DEFINITIONS

3.1. ‘Academic Week’ is a unit of five working days in which the distribution of work is organized from day one to day five, with five contact hours of one hour duration on each day.

3.2. ‘Choice Based Course’ means a course that enables the students to familiarize the advanced areas of core course.

3.3. ‘College Coordinator’ is a teacher nominated by the College Council to co-ordinate the continuous evaluation undertaken by various departments within the college. He/she shall be nominated to the college level monitoring committee.

3.4. ‘Common Course I’ means a course that comes under the category of courses for English.

3.5. ‘Common Course II’ means additional language.

3.6. ‘Complementary Course’ means a course which would enrich the study of core courses.

3.7. ‘Core course’ means a course in the subject of specialization within a degree programme. It includes a course on environmental studies and human rights.

- 3.8. 'Course' means a portion of a subject to be taught and evaluated in a semester (similar to a paper under annual scheme).
- 3.9. 'Credit' is the numerical value assigned to a paper according to the relative importance of the syllabus of the programme.
- 3.10. 'Department' means any teaching department in a college.
- 3.11. 'Department Coordinator' is a teacher nominated by a Department Council to coordinate the continuous evaluation undertaken in that department.
- 3.12. 'Department Council' means the body of all teachers of a department in a college.
- 3.13. 'Faculty Advisor' means a teacher from the parent department nominated by the Department Council, who will advise the student on academic matters.
- 3.14. Grace Marks shall be awarded to candidates as per the University Orders issued from time to time.
- 3.15. 'Grade' means a letter symbol (A, B, C, etc.), which indicates the broad level of performance of a student in a Paper/Course/Semester/Programme.
- 3.16. 'Grade Point' (GP) is the numerical indicator of the percentage of marks awarded to a student in a course.
- 3.17. 'Institutional Average (IA)' means average mark secured (Internal + external) for a course at the college level.
- 3.18. 'Open Course' means an optional course which the student is free to take at his/her will. Open course shall be a non-major elective course offered by the Departments other than the parent Department.
- 3.19. 'Parent Department' means the department which offers core course/courses within an undergraduate programme.
- 3.20. 'Programme' means a three year programme of study and examinations spread over six semesters, the successful completion of which would lead to the award of a degree.
- 3.21. 'Semester' means a term consisting of a minimum 90 working days, inclusive of tutorials, examination days and other academic activities within a period of six months.
- 3.22. 'University Average (UA)' means average mark secured (Internal + external) for a course at the University level.

- 3.23. 'Vocational Course' (Skill Enhancement Course) means a course that enables the students to enhance their practical skills and ability to pursue a vocation in their subject of specialization.
- 3.24. Words and expressions used and not defined in this regulation shall have the same meaning assigned to them in the Act and Statutes of the University.

4. ELIGIBILITY FOR ADMISSION AND RESERVATION OF SEATS

- 4.1 Eligibility for admissions and reservation of seats for various Undergraduate Programmes shall be according to the rules framed by the University in this regard, from time to time.

5. DURATION

- 5.1 The duration of U.G. programmes shall be 6 semesters.
- 5.2 There shall be two Semesters in an academic year, the "ODD" semester commences in June and on completion, the "EVEN" Semester commences. There shall be two months vacation during April/May.
- 5.3 The maximum continuous twelve semesters for successful completion of the programme shall be counted from the initial admission of the student to the first semester of the programme, irrespective of readmission.

6. REGISTRATION

- 6.1. The strength of students for each programme shall be as per the existing orders, as approved by the University.
- 6.2. The college shall send a list of students registered for each programme in each semester giving the details of courses registered including repeat/re-appearance courses to the University in the prescribed form within 45 days from the commencement of the Semester.
- 6.3. Those students who possess the required minimum attendance during a semester and could not register for the semester examination are permitted to apply for Notional Registration to the examinations concerned enabling them to get promoted to the next class.

7. SCHEME AND SYLLABUS

- 7.1. The U.G. programmes shall include (a) Common Courses I and II, (b) Core Course(s), (c) Complementary/Vocational Courses, and (d) Open Course.

- 7.2. There shall be one Choice Based course (Elective Course) in the sixth semester. In the case of B.Com Programme there shall be an elective stream from third semester onwards.
- 7.3. Credit Transfer and Accumulation system can be adopted in the programme. Transfer of Credit consists of acknowledging, recognizing and accepting credits by an institution for programmes or courses completed at another institution. The Credit Transfer Scheme shall allow students pursuing a programme in one University to continue their education in another University without break.
- 7.4. A separate minimum of 30% marks each for internal and external (for both theory and practical) and aggregate minimum of 35% are required for a pass for a course. For a pass in a programme, a separate minimum of Grade D is required for all the individual courses. If a candidate secures F Grade for any one of the courses offered in a Semester/Programme, only F grade will be awarded for that Semester/Programme until he/she improves this to D Grade or above within the permitted period. (See Clause 5.3)
- 7.5. The betterment chance can be availed for semester or semesters of one's choice. In such cases, one has to appear for external examinations of all the courses of that particular semester(s). There is no provision for betterment of internal evaluation marks as well as marks for practicals/projects/viva/on the job training.
- 7.6. Students who take readmission as per CBCS regulation 2017 shall appear for internal and external examinations of all theory and practical courses of previous semesters which he/she had completed under CBCSS regulations 2013.
- 7.7. The Practical examinations of such programmes, for which the syllabus provides for conducting the examinations in all semesters, shall be conducted accordingly. Where practical examinations are conducted in odd semesters as a separate course, the mark shall be 80 for external evaluation and 20 for internal evaluation. The marks for internal evaluation in such cases are as per clause 11.2 (d).

9. EXAMINATIONS

9.1 The evaluation of each paper shall contain two parts:

- (i) Internal or In-Semester Assessment (ISA)
- (ii) External or End-Semester Assessment (ESA)

9.2. The internal to external assessment ratio shall be 1:4. Both internal and external marks are to be rounded to the next integer. All papers (theory & practical), grades are given on a 7-point scale based on the total percentage of marks, (ISA + ESA) as given below:-

10. CREDIT POINT AND CREDIT POINT AVERAGE

Credit Point (CP) of a paper is calculated using the formula:-

$CP = C \times GP$, where C is the Credit and GP is the Grade point

Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) of a Semester is calculated using the formula:-

$SGPA = TCP/TC$, where TCP is the Total Credit Point of that semester.

Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) is calculated using the formula:-

$CGPA = TCP/TC$, where TCP is the Total Credit Point of that programme.

Grade Point Average (GPA) of different category of courses viz. Common Course I, Common Course II, Complementary Course I, Complementary Course II, Vocational course, Core Course is calculated using the formula:-

$GPA = TCP/TC$, where TCP is the Total Credit Point of a category of course.

TC is the total credit of that category of course.

For programmes having on the job training courses (OJT), if there is no external evaluation and the marks are to be awarded fully by internal examiners, the total marks of 100 shall be divided into 20:80 similar to the other courses.

13. ASSIGNMENTS

Assignments are to be done from 1st to 4th Semesters. At least one assignment should be done in each semester for all courses.

14. SEMINAR/VIVA

A student shall present a seminar in the 5th semester for each paper and appear for Viva-voce in the 6th semester for each course.

15. INTERNAL ASSESSMENT TEST PAPERS

Two test papers are to be conducted in each semester for each course. The evaluations of all components are to be published and are to be acknowledged by the candidates. All documents of internal assessments are to be kept in the college for one year and shall be made available for verification by the University. The responsibility of evaluating the internal assessment is vested on the teacher(s), who teach the course.

15.1 Grievance Redressal Mechanism

Internal assessment shall not be used as a tool for personal or other type of vengeance. A student has all rights to know, how the teacher arrived at the marks. In order to address the grievance of students, a three-level Grievance Redressal mechanism is envisaged. A student can approach the upper level only if grievance is not addressed at the lower level.

Level 1: Department Level:

The Department cell chaired by the HOD, Department Coordinator, Faculty Advisor and Teacher in-charge as members.

Level 2: College level

A committee with the Principal as Chairman, College Coordinator, HOD of concerned Department and Department Coordinator as members.

Level 3: University Level

A Committee constituted by the Vice-Chancellor as Chairman, Pro-Vice-Chancellor, Convener - Syndicate Standing Committee on Students Discipline and Welfare, Chairman-Board of Examinations as members and the Controller of Examination as member-secretary.

- 15.2 The College Council shall nominate a Senior Teacher as coordinator of internal evaluations. This coordinator shall make arrangements for giving awareness of the internal evaluation components to students immediately after commencement of I semester
- 15.3 The internal evaluation marks/grades in the prescribed format should reach the University before the 4th week of October and March in every academic year.

16. External Examination

The external theory examination of all semesters shall be conducted by the University at the end of each semester.

- 16.1 Students having a minimum of 75% average attendance for all the courses only can register for the examination. Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 10 days in a semester subject to a maximum of 2 times during the whole period of the programme may be granted by the University on valid grounds. This condonation shall not be counted for internal assessment. Benefit of attendance may be granted to students attending University/College union/Co-curricular activities by treating them as present for the days of absence, on production of participation/attendance certificates, within one week, from competent authorities and endorsed by the Head of the institution. This is limited to a maximum of 10 days per semester and this benefit shall be considered for internal assessment also. Those students who are not eligible even with condonation of shortage of attendance shall repeat the semester along with the next batch after obtaining readmission.
- 16.2 All students are to do a **project in the area of core course**. This project can be done individually or in groups(not more than five students) for all subjects which may be carried out in or outside the campus. Special sanction shall be obtained from the Vice-Chancellor to those **new generation programmes** and programmes on **performing arts** where students have to take projects which involve larger groups. The projects are to be identified during the II semester of the programme with the help of the supervising teacher. The report of the project in duplicate is to be submitted to the department at the sixth semester and are to be produced before the examiners appointed by the University. External Project evaluation and Viva / Presentation is compulsory for all subjects and will be conducted at the end of the programme.

- 16.3 There shall be supplementary exams only for fifth semester. Notionally registered candidates can also apply for the said supplementary examinations. For reappearance/improvement for other semesters the students can appear along with the next batch.
- 16.4 A student who registers his/her name for the external exam for a semester will be eligible for promotion to the next semester.
- 16.5 A student who has completed the entire curriculum requirement, but could not register for the Semester examination can register notionally, for getting eligibility for promotion to the next semester.
- 16.6 A candidate who has not secured minimum marks/credits in internal examinations can re-do the same registering along with the University examination for the same semester, subsequently. There shall be no improvement for internal evaluation.
17. All courses shall have unique alphanumeric code. Each teacher working in affiliated institutions shall have a unique identification code and this code is to be noted with the valuation, invigilation and all other examination duties.

18. PATTERN OF QUESTIONS

Questions shall be set to assess knowledge acquired, standard and application of knowledge, application of knowledge in new situations, critical evaluation of knowledge and the ability to synthesize knowledge. The question setter shall ensure that questions covering all skills are set. She/he shall also submit a detailed scheme of evaluation along with the question paper. A question paper shall be a judicious mix of short answer type, short essay type /problem solving type and long essay type questions.

19. RANK CERTIFICATE

The University publishes rank list of top 10 candidates for each programme after the publication of 6th semester results. Rank certificate shall be issued to candidates who secure positions from 1st to 3rd in the rank list. Candidates who secure positions from fourth to tenth in the rank list shall be issued position certificate indicating their position in the rank list.

Candidates shall be ranked in the order of merit based on the CGPA scored by them. Grace marks awarded to the students should not be counted fixing the rank/position. Rank certificate and position certificate shall be signed by the Controller of Examinations.

Each BOS shall specify the length of the answers in terms of number of words. Pattern of questions for external examination of practical papers will be decided by the concerned Board of Studies/Expert Committees.

20. MARK CUM GRADE CARD

The University under its seal shall issue to the students a MARK CUM GRADE CARD on completion of each programme, which shall contain the following information:

- Name of the University
- Name of the College
- Title & Model of the Undergraduate Programme
- Name of the Semester
- Name and Register Number of the student
- Date of publication of result
- Code, Title, Credits and Maximum Marks (Internal, External & Total) of each course opted in the semester.

- (h) Internal, External and Total Marks awarded, Grade, Grade point and Credit point in each course opted in the semester.
 - (i) The total credits and total credit points in the semester.
 - (i) Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and corresponding Grade.
 - (k) Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA), GPA corresponding to Common Courses I and II, Core Course, Complementary Courses, Vocational Courses and Open Course.
 - (l) The final Mark cum Grade Card issued at the end of the final semester shall contain the details of all courses taken during the final semester examination and shall include the final Grade(SGPA) scored by the candidate from 1st to 5th semesters, and the overall Grade for the total programme.
20. There shall be **3 level monitoring** committees for the successful conduct of the scheme. They are -
- 1. Department Level Monitoring Committee (DLMC), comprising HOD and two senior most teachers as members.
 - 2. College Level Monitoring Committee (CLMC), comprising Principal, College Council secretary and A.O./Superintendent as members.
 - 3. University Level Monitoring Committee (ULMC), headed by the Vice-Chancellor, Pro-Vice-Chancellor, Conveners of Syndicate Standing Committee on Examination, Academic Affairs and Registrar as members and the Controller of Examinations as member-secretary.

21. TRANSITORY PROVISION

Notwithstanding anything contained in these regulations, the Vice-Chancellor shall, for a period of one year from the date of coming into force of these regulations, have the power to provide by order that these regulations shall be applied to any programme with such modifications as may be necessary.

22. The Vice Chancellor is authorized to make necessary criteria for eligibility for higher education in the grading scheme, if necessary, in consultation with other Universities. The Vice Chancellor is also authorized to issue orders for the perfect realization of the Regulations.

GENERAL RULES OF DISCIPLINE

With their enrolment in the College, the students have to abide by the rules and regulations of the College framed in accordance with the norms set by the Government, the University and the Authorities of the College.

Students are expected to observe these rules strictly

- The Principal is the supreme authority in the college. He is entitled to suspend, dismiss or take any punitive measures against the misconduct of students.
- The College begins with a prayer everyday recited on the public address system. Students are expected to stand wherever they are and participate silently in the prayer.
- Students should be prompt and punctual.
- Students should dress modestly and use decent language in their communication.
- Every student should handle College property with care. He/she should keep the classroom clean and tidy. Students found guilty of writing or scribbling on the walls of any building of the College should be punished.
- Students should not enter or leave a class when a session is in progress without the permission of the teacher.
- Mobile phones are strictly banned inside the College campus. In the event of any violation of the above rule, a fine of Rs. 500/- will be levied as penalty. If repeated by the same student the Principal or the teachers empowered will seize the phone.
- Smoking, consuming alcohol, ragging, eve-teasing, using abusive language and other anti-social activities are strictly prohibited.
- Without the previous sanction of the Principal, the students are not permitted;
 - (a) to convene or attend meetings of any kind in the College campus.
 - (b) to make use of megaphones and loud speakers in the campus.

- (c) to collect subscription of any kind
- (d) to stick notices anywhere on the College campus.
- (e) to invite persons who are not approved of by the Principal and the Heads of Departments.
- (f) To distribute any kind of food or beverages within the College premises.

- Photo identity cards will be issued to all students in the College. He/she is expected to wear it during working hours in the College. A student who is unable to produce his/her ID card on demand should be reprimanded and fined.

THE PROCEDURE FOR IMPOSITION OF PUNISHMENT

- a) The Principal of the College shall be the disciplinary authority in respect of the students in the College.
- b) If it comes to the notice of the Principal that a student or a class of students have committed misconduct as referred to in Rule 5 above and that the Principal perceives that there is prima facie enough material in the allegation against the delinquent student/class, he shall immediately pass an order suspending the student/students from the College.
- c) If the Principal thinks that the delinquency alleged in the complaint requires further investigation/enquiry, he shall report the matter to the Staff Council. After reporting the matter and after seeking the views of the Council, the Principal shall appoint a competent teacher or a team of teachers to enquire into the matter and to submit the report at the earliest.
- d) The Enquiry Officer so appointed shall conduct enquiry without delay after gathering oral or written evidence from the complainant as well as the person against whom the allegations/delinquency, were made. The Enquiry Officer also shall give fair and reasonable opportunity to all parties and shall submit a report to the Principal. Based on the report, the Principal shall take appropriate action, which he deems fit, including the imposition of the following punishments.
 1. Imposition of fine.

2. Issuance of compulsory transfer certificate.

3. Dismissal from the College.

In the event of imposition of fine, dismissal or compulsory issuance of transfer certificate, the Principal shall forward the order along with the report to the University.

STUDENTS' GRIEVANCES REDRESS CELL

There is a Students' grievances redress cell in the College constituted under the chairmanship of the Principal. The committee shall consist of three teachers nominated by the College Council of whom one shall be a lady teacher. The Chairman of the College Union as well as the Secretary shall be the ex-officio members of the said committee. The committee shall meet once in every month and evaluate the steps taken to frame guidelines or general instructions or directions for the maintenance of peaceful atmosphere in the campus.

SC/ST Grievances Cell

There is a SC/ST grievances cell in the College constituted under the chairmanship of the Principal. The committee shall consist of three teachers nominated by the College Council.

Right to Appeal

A student against whom the disciplinary orders had been passed; shall have a right to appeal to the Board for Adjudication of Students' Grievances as provided in chapter 27 of Mahatma Gandhi University Statute 1997. The appellate authority shall have the power to set aside, modify or cancel the order, provided the appeal is found to be genuine and filed within the period of 30 days from the date of receipt of the order. The appellate authority shall also have the power to condone the delay in filing the appeal if it is proved to the satisfaction of the appellate authority by the appellant that he was prevented by sufficient cause from preferring the appeal within the time.

Higher Education - Rules and Regulations for the Smooth
Functioning of the Campus (extracts)

No. 26433/GI/15/H.Edn.

Dated, Thiruvananthapuram, 12.10.2015.

- ☛ All Celebrations in the campus, including Union activities, should be held only after getting prior permission from the Head of the Institution. Celebrations of any type should be communicated to the Head of the Institution through concerned Staff Advisor at least five working days prior to the event, with programme details, guests attending, source of funds, expenditure estimates etc. The 'Discipline Committee' should monitor and supervise the celebrations in the College.
- ☛ Students' Union activities should be supervised by a Committee chaired by the Head of the Institution with Staff Advisor as Convenor, and HoDs and Discipline Committee members.
- ☛ All students have to wear identity tag in the College.
- ☛ No type of vehicles should be used during celebrations inside the College campus.
- ☛ Students' vehicles will be allowed only up to the designated parking area. Entry beyond that point is strictly prohibited.
- ☛ If any complaint is received from the public to the Head of the Institution about the misbehavior of students and about activities like keeping weapons, consuming alcohol, using drugs in campus etc., steps will be taken as per the rules in force.
- ☛ CCTV Cameras will be installed in selected common places.
- ☛ Public, including former students, will be allowed to enter the college campus only for genuine reasons. They will not be allowed to enter the class rooms in any case.

- ☛ Programmes by external agencies/professional groups/paid programmes such as DJ, musical events should not be permitted inside the campus.
- ☛ No type of fund raising from the students should be permitted, as these practices lead to extortion and misuse of funds.
- ☛ Bike race/motor car race/elephant procession or similar activities should not be permitted inside the campus.
- ☛ In the interest of security of students, police may be informed in advance about all festival celebrations.
- ☛ For all students' programmes in the campus, presence of teachers is mandatory.

ANTI NARCOTIC CLUB

The College and the Department of Excise, Vaikom have jointly constituted an Anti Narcotic Club in the campus. It aims at creating an awareness among students against substance abuse and alcoholism which act as canker worm eating into the vitality and vigour of our youth. THE COLLEGE LIBRARY

Rules and Regulations

1. All members of the staff and students are members of the college library.
2. All users must bring their College Identity card when they visit library.
3. All users must read their identity card in the e-gate facility during their entry and exit to the library.
4. The library will be open from 9.15 am to 4.30 pm on all working days.

5. One notebook/sheets of paper may be taken inside the library for note taking. No printed materials are allowed inside the library.
6. Personal belongings may be kept in the property shelf kept outside the library.
7. A silent/calm atmosphere should be maintained within the library and its premises.
8. Our library is an open access library. Books in Lending Section can be borrowed by the user after circulation counter procedures.
9. Library is providing OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) facility through which users can search their needed books by themselves.
10. Reference books and periodicals cannot be borrowed .However, back volumes of magazines, journals or reference books (in special circumstances) may be granted for overnight issue. But the user should return it in the next working day morning itself. Failing this may cause cancellation of library membership.
11. Users should maintain the library documents in good condition without scribbling, dampening etc.; failing which may cause replacement of the same book or fine payment as per government rules.
12. A user have to examine the condition of the book thoroughly if there is any damage before borrowing the book from the library and notify the defect to the staff in the circulation counter. Otherwise user will be responsible for the damage of the book .
13. Damaged books will not be issued.
14. A UG student can borrow 3 books maximum at a time and a PG student can borrow 5 .Teachers can borrow 10 books at a time. Non teaching staff can also take 3 at a time.
15. The period of loan is 14 days for students and 30 days for teachers. The date of return will be marked on the date label inside the book. A Failure to return on the recorded date will have to pay a fine of Rs.1 per day. However if there is any government orders to relax fine amount in the library for a particular period, it will be applicable in our library also.
16. The fine accumulated will be collected when the time of issuing Transfer Certificate/Leaving Certificate/No Dues Certificate from the College.
17. Though a library book is issued to any borrower category, College Librarian has the discretion to recall the book at any time. College Librarian can also cut down the loan period of a high demand book.

18. If a book is lost or missing the user has to report it to the College Librarian immediately and the user has to replace the same book or pay the fine by a stipulated time decided by the Principal. If one volume/issue in a set of books/journals is lost by a user, he/she has to replace the whole set. If the user can replace the same copy of same edition, it will be accepted. As per the government rules the fine will be as follows:

Books published after 1980	= 3 times the cost of the book
Books published in between 1950 – 1980	= 6 times the cost of the book
Books published before 1950	= 10 times the cost of the book
Rare books	= as decided by the Principal according to its relevance

19. Queue system should be maintained in the Circulation Counter for issue and return of books.
20. A library user (staff /Student) has to obtain a 'No Dues certificate' from the library or a sign from the College Librarian in the 'No Dues form' issued from the College Office at the time of leaving the institution.
21. Users are requested to return all the books borrowed from the library before March 31 of every year. A notice and Library Defaulters list will be displayed in the library notice board to return the books by March 1st week.
22. Students are expected to maintain discipline in the library and should give respect to the library staff.
23. College Librarian has the right to suspend the use of library for a user in consultation with Principal for a particular time as a disciplinary action.
24. The Library Committee has the right to amend or add Library Rules at any time of the academic year.

FEE REGULATION

1. Tuition fees are to be paid at the commencement of each semester. Special fees will be collected along with the first instalment.
2. If a student fails to pay the fee on the due date, a fine of Rs.5/- will be levied in addition for the next 7 days and Rs.10/- after the seventh day of default. If the 7 th day happens to be a holiday the next working day will be considered as the 7 th day.
3. If the fees and fines of an instalment are not paid at the last opportunity, the name of the student will be removed from the rolls of

the college with effect from the date following the expiry of this period and the student will not get the benefit of attendance thereafter. If the student is to be readmitted he/she has to apply for special permission from the Principal and also remit all the arrears of fees with fine. The readmitted students will get the benefit of attendance only from the date of readmission.

4. If a student studying for any course in Arts & Science College leaves with T.C. and is admitted in another similar College, in the state, he/she shall pay the fees for the term only in one College. He/she should produce the receipts and certificates of remittance obtained from the College which he/she is leaving to the College where he/she is admitted. However, special fees and caution deposits will have to be paid again at the new College.
5. Absence with or without leave from the College shall not be an excuse for non payment of fees.
6. Students who are admitted for a semester for making up shortage of attendance, should pay the tuition fees for the semester together with full special fees and caution deposit at the time of admission.
7. Every student is liable to pay the prescribed fee for the whole semester during any part of which his/her name is on the rolls of the College. In case of students admitted late after the commencement of the academic year the fees for the preceding months, if any, must be collected at the time of admission.

ISSUE OF CERTIFICATES

Students requiring certificates of Transfer, Character and Conduct, Course, Marks, Identification etc. should submit an application to the Principal, stating the Name, Year of study, Class Number, Semester and Subject. They are advised to give a notice of 48 hours prior to the issue of certificates.

TRANSFER CERTIFICATE (T.C)

No T.C. will be issued to those who owe any dues to the College. No fee will be levied from those who apply for T.C. within one year after leaving the College. A fee of Rs. 15/- will be levied from those who apply for T.C. after the lapse of one year from the date of leaving the College. An additional fee of Rs. 30/- will be levied from those who apply for duplicate copy of T.C. Duplicate copy will be issued only on production of the certificate issued by a Judicial First Class Magistrate stating the irrecoverable loss of the original T.C. Every student should take his/her T.C. at the end of the course and the same when admitted to the next course.

COURSE AND CONDUCT CERTIFICATE

Certificates like 'Course and Conduct' certificate and Transfer Certificate will be issued only after books borrowed from the Library are duly returned and equipment in the concerned laboratories are kept in good condition. A certificate of good character is a testimonial a student should earn. This will be issued only after the concerned authority testifies his/her character.

ATTENDANCE AND LEAVE

The College has set the regulations for attendance in accordance with the rules issued by the University. They are as follows

- ▶ A student will be permitted to register and appear for the semester examination only if he/she secures not less than 75% attendance in the respective semester.
- ▶ Students having a minimum of 75% average attendance for all the courses only can register for the examination. Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 10 days or 50 hours in a

semester subject to a maximum of 2 times during the whole period of the programme may be granted by the University on valid grounds. This condonation shall not be counted for internal assessment.

- ▶ Benefit of attendance may be granted to students attending University/College union/Co-curricular activities by treating them as present for the days of absence, on production of participation/attendance certificates, within one week, from competent authorities and endorsed by the Head of the institution. This is limited to a maximum of 10 days per semester and this benefit shall be considered for internal assessment also.
 - ▶ Those students who are not eligible even with condonation of shortage of attendance shall repeat the course along with the next batch.
 - ▶ Attendance shall be marked at the beginning of each class -lecture, practical or tutorial, by the teacher concerned.
 - ▶ Students shall occupy their seats before attendance is taken. Late comers can enter the classroom only with the permission of the teacher.
 - ▶ Absence of two periods a day shall be considered an absence for a whole day, and absence of one period for half day.
 - ▶ Application for leave should be forwarded to the Principal through the class warden. It should be countersigned by the parent or guardian.
 - ▶ Application for leave should be made in advance or on the very day of return
 - ▶ Disciplinary action will be initiated against those who repeatedly absent without sufficient reason
 - ▶ A student absenting himself without leave for more than 10 consecutive working days will have his/her name removed from the rolls and he/she will have to pay all College fees due before he/she is readmitted.
 - ▶ Students participating in sports and games or any other College Union activities should get prior sanction from the Principal on prescribed form recommended by the concerned Head of the Department or Teacher -in-charge.
 - ▶ The responsibility of making sure that he/she has the required attendance rests only with the student.
- Compliance with these rules make a student eligible to appear for the End Semester Examination.

STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES

Value Education

Value education replaces the traditional, moral instruction classes. Value education aims at making the students aware of the values they should cherish and helps them to live upto those values. We have worked out a system for conducting value education classes for the students.

Study skills

During the first week of the academic session, an extensive programme on study skills and personality development is given to the students. This is a one day programme. Follow-up action of this is done through periodical seminars, workshops etc.

Retreat for staff and students

A three- day renewal programme for all the staff of the college is regularly arranged. A two-day life orientation and spiritual renewal programme for all the students usually in different groups, is conducted every year.

Career and Placement Cell

A Career Centre cum Library is functioning in the College from 1996 September onwards. It has a number of books, periodicals, magazines and journals specializing in employment news and information relating to career opportunities. Besides the centre provides career guidance seminars and placement assistance to the students. Student volunteers also are actively involved in the running of the centre. This is the most frequently visited section of the College by the inquisitive students and staff.

Entrepreneurship Development Club (ED Club)

The aim of the Entrepreneurship Development Club is to inculcate entrepreneurial culture among students to equip them with the skills and techniques to acclimatize them with the future challenges. The motto of the club is to develop business skills to achieve success in new ventures they undertake. Regular interaction with entrepreneurs and industrial visits will be the main activities of the club.

Jesus Youth (JY) / Campus Ministry

Jesus Youth is an organization for developing creative leadership among the students. All the catholic students of the College are the members of the JY and all the catholic members of the staff are its honorary members.

1. The Principal is the ex- officio Patron of JY. There shall be a Director nominated by the Principal from among the Catholic members of the staff. There shall be a Unit President, Vice-President, Secretary, Joint Secretary and a Treasurer selected by the students. These members will be the managing committee of JY.
2. The Unit President shall, with the guidance of the Director, arrange camps, seminars, lectures and other programmes on religious and social issues of special interest, to the students. The Secretary in association with the President, shall see to the proper conduct of the affairs of the organization and prepare the minutes of the meeting and present the Annual Report.

Women's Cell

The women's Cell started functioning in the College with the exclusive aim of enabling the lady students to grow and develop by giving training to them in personality development, career orientation, home management, etc. It is an operational wing in the college of the All India Association for Christian Higher Education, (AIACHE), New Delhi.

The objectives of the women's Cell include the overall development of the personality of the lady students in the College through:

1. Awareness of their equal rights and privileges and responsibility in building up the society.
2. Cultivating in them a deeper interest in the cultural heritage of our country.
3. Bringing out the best in them by providing opportunities in the form of discussions, seminars, symposia, exposure programmes, leadership camps and workshops, taking up projects in related issues, study tours etc.

4. Above all, developing leadership qualities in them. Membership for the women's forum is open to all students in the College. Those of them who are interested in pursuing the above objectives may enroll themselves as members. The forum functions under the overall guidance of the Principal under a Director and a team of advisors. The Principal appoints the staff co-ordinator and the team members.

NATIONAL CADET CORPS

The National Cadet Corps (NCC) gives opportunities for military training and social service to College students without imposing in them any obligation for active military service.

The objectives of NCC are:-

1. To develop character, comradeship, ideals of service and capacity for leadership in the youth.
2. To provide service training to the students so as to stimulate interest in the defence of the country.
3. To build up potential officers for the defence of the country in a National Emergency.

The immediate benefit of NCC training is the improvement in physical and mental capacity, cultivating a sense of pride in smart turn out and bearing, fostering a sense of discipline and responsibility, developing a social personality, an aptitude for leadership and inculcation of the principles and values of military service.

Members of the organisation have definite obligation for attending training programmes. Their attendance at weekly parades held during the academic year is compulsory. Parades will cease three weeks before Annual Vacation.

Eligibility conditions for Certificate Examinations

1. 'B' Certificate.
 - a) The cadet must have attended a minimum of 75% of total training period laid down in the syllabus for the first year.
 - b) Must have attended one Annual Training Camp/N.I.C.

2. 'C' Certificate

- a) The cadet must have qualified 'B' certificate
- b) The cadet must be in second year of SD/SW N.C.C. training.
- c) The cadet must have attended a minimum of 75% of the periods of 2nd year syllabus.
- d) Must have attended two A.T.C.s

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (N.S.S.)

The Government of India introduced the National Service Scheme in Colleges and Universities in the year 1971-72. The Universities in Kerala implemented NSS programme from 1976-77. The first NSS unit of our college started functioning in 1983. We have sanction for two units in the college.

The aim of NSS is to educate the students through community service and enrich their personality and deepen their understanding of the social environment in which they live. The more specific objectives of the NSS are to arouse in the students a social commitment towards nation building and to provide them opportunities to work with people for community development.

Although admission to the Scheme is voluntary, once a student opts for it, it will be compulsory for him/ her to complete the minimum 120 hours in a year in the scheme activities. Hence they should be prepared to utilize their holidays and vacations for field work whenever required. The NSS volunteers who complete the minimum requirements for two consecutive years will be given a certificate from the University signed by the Vice Chancellor. The holders of such certificates are eligible to get weightage of marks at the time of admission to any course of study.

SPORTS AND ARTS CLUB

The College provides facilities for various sports and games and encourages participation at various levels under the guidance of the Physical Education Department. The College Union under the guidance of the staff advisor conducts Arts Festival and other Union activities which provide a good platform for the students to exhibit their innate talents at various levels.

Parent Teacher Association (P.T.A.)

There is a very active Parent Teacher Association in the college. The executive committee has taken upon themselves the responsibility of providing amenities to the students in the college and to assist the college administration for the proper running of the college. Every parent or guardian becomes a member of the Association when their wards are admitted in the college. The office bearers are elected annually in the general body meeting.

In Semester Examinations

1. At least one internal test-paper is to be attended in each semester for each course. The evaluations of all components are to be published and are to be acknowledged by the candidates. All documents of internal assessments are to be kept in the college for two years and shall be made available for verification by the University. The responsibility of evaluating the internal assessment is vested on the teacher(s), who teach the course.
2. After each Examination, a particular day is fixed for the interaction of teachers with the parents. Every student has to come to the college along with the parent and meet the class teacher concerned. The class teacher will hand over the progress report directly to the parent in the presence of their wards. The class teacher will instruct the parent and student to meet all the teachers. After meeting all the other teachers and if required by the Principal, the parent has to meet the class teacher again and return the signed counter foil of the Progress Report to the class teacher.
3. Students are not allowed to absent themselves from examinations, test papers, compositions and internal assignments.

REMEDIAL COACHING

Academically challenged students are identified after conducting an entry level test and they are given additional support outside the class hours to build up their confidence and also to prepare them to face the examination with the right aptitude and attitude.

MUSIC CLUB

The music club inspires and encourages the gifted students to delve deep into this genre. It enlivens the spirit of music in students.

St. XAVIER'S INSTITUTE OF INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY (XIIT)

St. Xavier's Institute of Information Technology (XIIT) is a sister concern of St. Xavier's College Vaikom. It is an authorised training centre of Kerala State Rutronix and has been established with the assistance of University Grants Commission. Institute offers courses like PGDCA, DCA, Tally, Web Designing, Photoshop and Certificate in Computing. All the courses are approved by the Government of Kerala and the Kerala Public Service Commission. The I.T. Lab is equipped with latest PCs, LCD Projector, Printer and Broadband connectivity.

ENGLISH CLUB

This programme is designed to develop the communicative skills of the students and also to enrich their vocabulary. Staff Co.ordinators of the programme are Smt. Merine John & Sri. P.C. Ravisankar.

GRIEVANCE REDRESS CELL

Growth and development entail mistakes and corrections. Forgiving and forgetting are essential for peaceful life in society. Redressall cell is functioning in the College to settle grievances of students. It has a three tier system as follows.

Tier II Head of the Department

Tier III Principal with the G.R. Cell

Any matter of dispute, complaint, act of indiscipline. etc. are submitted first to the class teacher of the student concerned. If justice is denied there, he/she shall approach Tier II and finally Tier III. The decision of the Principal shall be final.

SCHOLARSHIPS, FEE CONCESSION, STUDENTS AID FUND, AWARDS AND ENDOWMENTS

1. KPCR Fee Concession.

Students from economically backward families are exempted from payment of special fees and other tuition fees by the Govt. of Kerala order based on the Kumara Pillai Commission Report. Income limit for the concession is Rs.25,000/- per annum for Degree students and Rs.42,000/- per annum for P.G. Course.

2. Forward community students are eligible for any one of the following scholarships and fee concession subject to the minimum marks, annual family income etc.

a. National Loan Scholarship.

Rs.6000 and 7200 per annum for the entire course. Repayment in instalment should be made within a specific period after the studies if the scholar does not get the job of a teacher. Minimum marks required for consideration for the award is 50% and the annual family income should not exceed Rs.25000/-.

b. Kerala State Scholarship.

Minimum award is Rs.400/- which need not be refunded if the course is completed. Minimum mark required for consideration of the award is 50% and maximum limit of annual family income is Rs.6000/-

3. Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribe, X'tian Convert and Other Eligible Community students.

They are eligible for full fee concession, Lumpsum Grant and stipend. These students are eligible for the benefits irrespective of family income and marks, if information relating to the community and nativity is furnished by the Government authorities concerned.

4. Other Backward Community students whose annual family income do not exceed Rs.25,000/- for Degree course are eligible for full fee concession. Such students have to submit income certificate in the prescribed form issued by the Village Officer and countersigned by the Panchayat President/ Municipal Commissioner

5. Physically handicapped students' scholarship.

The Director of Social Welfare, Thiruvananthapuram shall award the scholarship. Those who have secured 45% and above marks for the qualifying examination and who are physically handicapped are eligible to apply for the scholarship.

6. Merit Scholarship to the children of School Teachers

Minimum marks 60%. No refund need be effected provided the course is completed satisfactorily.

7. Fisheries Scholarship.

Children of fishermen are eligible to be considered for the award of this scholarship.

8. Post-matric Scholarship:

For students belonging to minority communities, secured 50% marks in higher secondary and with annual income below Rs.2,00,000.

9. Kerala State Suvarna Jubilee Merit Scholarship:

For students belonging to BPL category and secured 50% marks in higher secondary.

10. Kerala State Merit Scholarship:

For students who secured 50% marks in higher secondary and with annual income below Rs.1,00,000.

11. Muslim Nadar Scholarship:

For students either belonging to backward communities or general category students below poverty line and annual income below Rs.1,00,000.

12. Central Sector Scholarship:

For students who secured 80% and above marks in higher secondary and with annual income below Rs.8,00,000.

13. Higher Education Scholarship:

For students belonging to any category and secured minimum marks required on the basis of their categories (i.e. SC- Pass, ST- 60%, BPL/OBC- 65% and General- 75%)

14. Vidya Samunnathi Scholarship:

For students who secured 70% and above marks in higher secondary, belonging to forward communities but economically backward and whose family annual income below Rs.2,00,000.

15. Snehapoorvam:

For students who have lost either their father or mother or both, with annual income below Rs.1,00,000.
